FRAME is dedicated to promoting French-American cooperation in the cultural arena of museums, their collections, and their professional staffs. It fosters enduring partnerships based on common projects and exchanges

of information, personnel, technology and resources. The projects range from a shared web site to joint exhibitions, educational resources and programs, and publications.
